

## **CALL TO WORSHIP**

- P: What brings you here today?
- C: We are here to commemorate a crucifixion; to see a man nailed to a cross of wood and left to hang there until pronounced dead. We are drawn by the power of this cross where Christ became sin for us.
- P: Well did Isaiah prophesy about this day, "See, my servant will act wisely; he will be raised and lifted up and highly exalted. Just as there were many who were appalled at him his appearance was so disfigured beyond that of any human being and his form marred beyond human likeness so he will sprinkle many nations, and kings will shut their mouths because of him.
- C: For what they were not told, they will see, and what they have not heard, they will understand.
- P: Who has believed our message and to whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed? He grew up before him like a tender shoot, and like a root out of dry ground. He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him.
- C: He was despised and rejected by mankind, a man of suffering, and familiar with pain. Like one from whom people hide their faces he was despised, and we held him in low esteem.
- P: Surely, he took up our pain and bore our suffering, yet we considered him punished by God, stricken by him, and afflicted.
- C: But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed.
- P: We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to our own way;
- C: and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all.
- P: He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth.
- C: By oppression and judgment he was taken away.
- P: Yet, who of his generation protested?
- C: For he was cut off from the land of the living; for the transgression of my people he was punished. He was assigned a grave with the wicked and with the rich in his death, though he had done no violence, nor was any deceit in his mouth.
- P: Yet it was the LORD's will to crush him and cause him to suffer, and though the LORD makes his life an offering for sin, he will see his offspring and prolong his days, and the will of the LORD will prosper in his hand.
- C: After he has suffered, he will see the light of life and be satisfied; by his knowledge my righteous servant will justify many, and he will bear their iniquities.
- P: Therefore, I will give him a portion among the great, and he will divide the spoils with the strong, because he poured out his life unto death, and was numbered with the transgressors.
- C: For he bore the sin of many and made intercession for the transgressors." (Isaiah 52&53)

- P: Do we have the courage to face the cross of Jesus and see it for what it is?
- C: Death is serious business and makes us uncomfortable.
- P: Do we have the courage to face the cross of Jesus and see it for what it is? Light confronts darkness. Life confronts death. Heaven confronts hell. This is a conflict with eternal, cosmic consequences that we remember and ponder today.
- C: We must be drawn to face the cross of Christ where He became sin for us, or we die alone and for all eternity.
- P: Do we have the courage to face the cross of Jesus and see it for what it is? We must look at the very core of our being and realize how dead and helpless we are by nature. We must listen with all diligence and allow the Holy Spirit through the Word of God to fuse the events of our life into the reality of Calvary.
- C: We must be drawn to face the cross of Jesus where his suffering is the punishment for our sins; His forsakenness is our hell; His death is our forgiveness. Lord, have mercy on us.

In silent prayer, keep your eyes on the cross and ponder what makes this Good Friday.



# READING: The Crucifixion of Jesus

John 19:17-30

<sup>17</sup>Carrying his own cross, he went out to what is called the Place of a Skull, which in Aramaic is called Golgotha. <sup>18</sup>There they crucified him with two others, one on each side, and Jesus in the middle.

<sup>19</sup>Pilate also had a notice written and fastened on the cross. It read, "Jesus the Nazarene, the King of the Jews."

<sup>20</sup>Many of the Jews read this notice, because the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city, and it was written in Aramaic, Latin, and Greek.

<sup>21</sup>So the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate, "Do not write, "The King of the Jews," but that this man said, 'I am the King of the Jews."

<sup>22</sup>Pilate answered, "What I have written, I have written."

<sup>23</sup>When the soldiers crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one part for each soldier. They also took his tunic, which was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom. <sup>24</sup>So they said to one another, "Let's not tear it. Instead, let's cast lots to see who gets it." This was so that the Scripture might be fulfilled which says:

They divided my garments among them and cast lots for my clothing.

So the soldiers did these things.

<sup>25</sup>Jesus' mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene were standing near the cross.

<sup>26</sup>When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son!" <sup>27</sup>Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother!" And from that time this disciple took her into his own home.

<sup>28</sup>After this, knowing that everything had now been finished, and to fulfill the Scripture, Jesus said, "I thirst."

<sup>29</sup>A jar full of sour wine was sitting there. So they put a sponge soaked in sour wine on a hyssop branch and held it to his mouth.

<sup>30</sup>When Jesus had received the sour wine, he said, "It is finished!" Then, bowing his head, he gave up his spirit.

In silent prayer, keep your eyes on the cross and ponder what makes this Good Friday.

- C: Keep our eyes focused on your cross so that we may face death head on. Lord, have mercy.


# READING: Jesus' Burial

John 19:38-42

<sup>38</sup>After this, Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate to let him remove Jesus' body. When Pilate gave him permission, he came and took Jesus' body away. <sup>39</sup>Nicodemus, who earlier had come to Jesus at night, also came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-two pounds.

<sup>40</sup>They took Jesus' body and bound it with linen strips along with the spices, in accord with Jewish burial customs.

<sup>41</sup>There was a garden at the place where Jesus was crucified. And in the garden was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. <sup>42</sup>So they laid Jesus there, because it was the Jewish Preparation Day, and the tomb was near.



With the end of this service, we have, as it were, laid our Savior in his tomb.

Consider taking some personal time to KEEP YOUR EYES ON THE CROSS before leaving.

Reflect on his death as the only way to face your own death head on.

Whenever you are ready, please leave the sanctuary as quietly as possible. We leave, believing Jesus' promise, "And in three days rise again."
